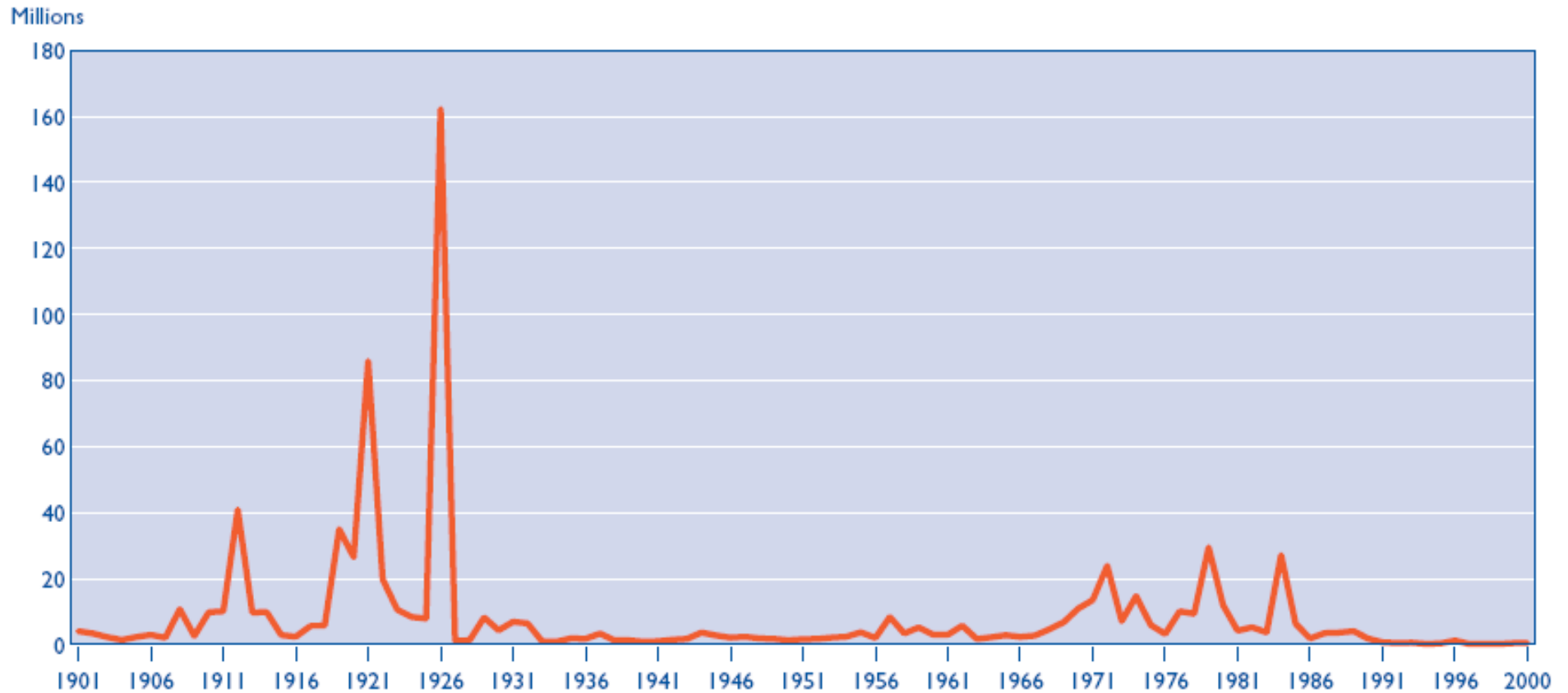


Number of working days lost due to labour disputes; United Kingdom; 1901 to 2000
